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
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President's Report


The year ahead


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Executive Officer's Report



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New Life Member 2021

Brett Thomas has customers who only buy Red Angus beef from his butcher shop. And the Woodvale butcher knows why his customers request it - its flavour is second to none.

Mr Thomas, who runs Meat Connoisseur in Woodvale, Western Australia, says Red Angus beef is a favourite for him. And he should know - he has been a butcher for 25 years.

He gets three bodies a fortnight from Ross and Tracy Collard, Tronar Red Angus stud, Beermullah, WA, and would love to use only Red Angus for his shop, but needs other breeds to fill in for the popular cuts.

He said the Red Angus are ideal, and his customers agree. "I just love the large carcase," he said. "They dress out around 300 kilograms. Customers want big sirloins and fillets."

The marbling was also spot on. "It's enough marbling to draw people in, but not too much. They don't want a big wad of fat in their scotch."

Mr Thomas makes sure his bodies are aged to perfection, hanging them for two weeks, which simply adds to high quality beef. "A lot of other beef is vacuum-sealed quickly and doesn't get that aging process, but you really notice the flavour," he said. "Ross's cattle are the perfect size."

His customers can't get enough of it. "It's definitely the flavour," he said. "I have customers who will only buy that beef."

And for Mr Collard, producing this kind of beef is the result of half a century of experience. He's been running Red Angus since the 1970s. Mr Collard's father used to run Angus cattle, but one day he bought a black bull with a red gene. "The red calves were in the top 10pc of the calves weaned," he said.

So they decided to make the switch, and he began his Red Angus stud in 1976 and hasn't looked back. He said there were many advantages to the breed. He knows they are highly fertile. "The bull always ends up in the neighbour's, but he's back before I can go and get him," he said. "The Red Angus are quieter and do better than other breeds. They are also earlier finishing. My weaners finish three weeks before my neighbour's cattle. And red cows on green grass look fantastic."

Red Angus carcases are known for their marbling and colour. Mr Collard has entered a number of competitions in Western Australia, even winning the carcase competition at Royal Perth Show. "In a number of competitions, when the results came

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back, the Red Angus were at the top of the Meat Standards Australia (MSA)," he said.

For David Hobbs, the breed focusing even more on carcase traits is a great move.

Mr Hobbs, Round-Em-Up Angus stud, Molong, has been breeding Red Angus cattle for 32 years, and stud cattle for 23 years. And for him, the beauty of Red Angus is they can improve any breed they are crossed with.

"They can flat-back a Brahman, and handle the heat of Queensland," he said. "They can improve the MSA grading of Brahmans, and poll any horned animal."

He said when crossed with other breeds such as Herefords, the Red Angus changed the eye pigment which helped reduce eye cancers.

Red Angus have exceptional maternal and milking traits, and impressive eating quality. "There aren't too many things out there that the Red Angus can't improve," he said. "They are every bit as good as any other breed."

Into the future, Mr Hobbs said the breed as a whole would be improving carcase quality even further. And this is something he is passionate about. During the drought, Round-Em-Up was selling premium boxed beef, a 21-day hung and aged product.


He said through this experience, he found that carcases needed to have enough fat cover on them to age them properly, and he had been focusing on sires with low to moderate birthweights and excellent carcase quality.

Mr Hobbs said another exciting development was that Red Angus would be awarding higher prize money for champion carcases in shows for schools. He was awarded reserve champion heavyweight steer at Sydney Royal Show competition last year, with a score of 91.5 points.

Red Angus Society of Australia's executive officer Kate McDonald backed this up, saying that Red Angus carcases have been performing well for breeders and users alike.

"There is a push to collect more data and by offering higher prize money for carcase competition nation-wide, it's hoped that it will increase participation and increase the amount of data available," she said.

Glen Kelly Red Angus crossbreeding in Queensland

A chance opportunity to try Red Angus in their beef operation near Rockhampton has lead Queensland producers, the Kelly family to meet market specifications and boost quality and profitability.

Weight gains have substantially improved while carcase data from the processors indicate an increase in MSA Index, yield and marble score in their Red Angus cross cattle, Glen Kelly said.

"Calves (from the first joining) hit the ground in April/May 2019 (earlier than we usually would like), and they grew like anything. They hit the ground tiny, and before we knew it we had 300 kilogram cattle at 15-18 months," he said.

"They were working out 50-60kg ahead of everything else."

Farming across Oakleaf, a 2307-hectare (5700 acres) property west of Rockhampton, Mr Kelly along with his wife Nikki and children Laine and Paige, runs a 250 head breeding herd which produces stock to go into their crop fattening operation

Originally, they were Hereford producers before going into Santa Gertrudis and Droughtmaster cattle in the 1990s.

"We then stuck with the Droughtmaster infused Brahman on the

Droughtmaster cross females,' he said.

They wanted to do something different and get more flat backs into the stock

Mr Kelly said he first introduced the Red Angus breed to their program in 2018 after coming across the grand champion Red Angus bull at Beef Australia that year. He was Round-Em-Up Morton M17 bred by the Hobbs family of Round-Em-Up stud, Molong, NSW.

"His length, and his whole attitude and quietness was exactly what we wanted, while he had the spring of rib, softness and colour." he said.

"Angus are renowned for their fertility, and I wanted to see how that went."

The Kelly family works on joining around 50 replacement heifers at 18 months to two years of age, with the rest culled.

"We are selecting for a feminine animal - big bullocky cows never do much for you," he said.

They have been a closed herd not buying in any cattle, except for bulls, for 30 years now.

"We are EU [European Union] accredited producers - it is the safest and best market overall for us," Mr Kelly said.

Mr Kelly is the sixth generation of his family farming at Oakleaf. They originally settled in the 1870s on a property called Edith Vale, purchasing the adjoining properties to grow their operation.

"We had beef cattle, and were dairy farmers before going into beef," he said.

Previously growing grain crops, including sorghum and winter crops such as wheat, the Kelly's finished doing this in the 1970s then moved into crop fattening.

"We have summer and winter fattening crops - forage, sugar graze, honey graze and winter oats," he said.

"We crop fatten cull heifers and grow steers to 300 kilogramplus dress weights, aiming to turn them off as quick as possible.

"Right up until the end of 2019 we always had them processed at Teys Australia Lakes Creek (Rockhampton)."

With crop fattening they achieve growth rates of two kilograms per head per day on average, while on grass they do an average of 1kg/hd/day.

Due to the drought, they moved to selling feed on steers leaving the place at 450kg.

"It has been awful here until recently. Last year we had 20 inches, 2018 we had 11 inches, 2019 we had eight inches," Mr Kelly said.

"We finished up on a skeleton herd here.

"We sent heifers to feedlot, a 44 head consignment of which 21 were Red Angus cattle - they were cattle that we would have grown out in the crop fattening, but the conditions didn't allow it.

"Some did 3.5 kilograms per head per day - it was extraordinary."

Rainfall over the past six months has helped get production back on track.

"We sent 80 steers in the last four months to Teys Australia for good money - money like we have never seen before," he said.

They have another line booked to go in the first week of processing at Teys in January and they will easily dress 300kg, Mr Kelly said.

"From previous carcase data, the marbling is what has impressed us the most.

"We've had success with good conditions enabling cattle to

grow, and as long as they are going forward their meat and fat colours are fine.

"There has been reasonable marbling, but with the Red Angus it is extraordinarily good.

"The other thing that blew us away with the cattle sent to the feedlot was with MSA Index and yielding.

"Even with a (hormone growth promotant) pill in ear which usually drops your MSA Index, they still performed, it didn't matter.

Mr Kelly said marbling was the main ticket.

"I know with black Angus they are renowned for marbling, but I am not a fan of black cattle that is just me," he said.

"I love red cattle, and I love red polled cattle.

"For what we do, to see marbling pop up overnight with crossbred cattle is what impresses me."

Mr Kelly's father Darrell is still involved in the cattle operation at 83 years of age, and he has a soft spot for the red cattle.

"He is pushing to get more," Mr Kelly said.

"He loves them as they used to have red Illawarra dairy cows for milking.

"He has a soft spot for a Red Angus type calf."


The acclimatisation of the Red Angus bulls to go into the north is crucial, Mr Kelly says.

"The biggest problem is getting Red Angus cattle up here; it is a totally different type of climate to the south.

"Red Angus will sell up here and into the north, but it is about acclimatising them to the conditions."

Angus achieves herdsman dream at SA Junior Heifer Expo

A childhood dream came true for Red Angus breeder Angus Llewellyn last week as he was named the senior champion herdsperson at the 2021 SA Junior Heifer Expo.

The 19-year-old from Willalooka, SA, had often glanced up over the years at the herdsperson honour board displayed behind the BBQ area during dinner times at the Expo venue, the Adelaide Showground, and hoped one day he would get his name on the honour roll.

"There are people on that board that I have looked up to from day one as a junior and have been mentors to me and many others, he said

"I remember looking up at big Nick (van den Berg) my first senior buddy when he won (in 2014) and never thought I would be as big as him but now I have won the herdsman too."

Mr Llewellyn - who was also the reserve senior champion handler - says it was a "huge surprise" to claim the coveted award in his first year competing in the senior section of the Expo for 18–23-year-olds.

"I came into seniors thinking I would use this year getting some advice and seeing what areas I needed to improve and then hopefully have my chance in a few years' time, I never thought I would win," he said.

Over the four days, the 28 entrants vying for the herdsperson title were assessed in areas including marketing, junior judging, clipping, stockmanship, tidiness of their stalls and their effort helping their junior buddy.

Mr Llewellyn's first Expo was in 2010 at when he was the youngest entrant at just eight years of age.

He has been back every year since -except 2020 when the Expo was cancelled- exhibiting cattle from his family's Jillangolo stud or his own Jillangus stud.


He says his 11 years participating in the all-breeds youth event have been lifechanging.

- "I have made a lot of contacts and three of my four closest mates are all from the heifer show," he said.
- "I have grown in confidence with my public speaking and my abilities to handle cattle have grown enormously."

Previous herdsperson winners have used the \$6500 scholarship sponsored by Nutrien and the Show Society Foundation to jet off to North America to experience their beef industry but due to COVID restrictions Angus will travel within Australia.

He is particularly keen to inspect Red Angus studs and visit commercial herds in southern Qld and northern NSW where there is strong demand for red bulls.

"I would like to go to up there and see the traits and type of genetics they are chasing. We may be able to breed bulls to supply this market," he said.

Instincts help Llewellyn to be named beef young judges champ

Angus Llewellyn trusted his instincts in the state beef young judges competition at the Royal Adelaide Show, which proved to be effective for the 17-old from Keith, who was crowned champion of the senior class.

"You have to trust those first thoughts, and not second guess yourself," he said.

"For the first animal that catches your eye, look into it, but don't look too hard because you might find something that plays with your mind, so trust your instincts and go with your initial thought."

Mr Llewellyn was named champion in front of second-placed Jacqui Palk, Eden Valley, and third-placed Rebekah Rushton, Angaston.

He has been taking part in the beef cattle young judges competition since he was just 12 years old, winning the junior class when he was 14 and 15, but this is the first time he has placed first in the senior section.

This year, the entrants had to class four Santa Gertrudis bulls, four Speckle Park heifers and four Simmental heifers, and present a summary of their reasonings for the Simmental line up.

Judge Daniel Shike, Illinois, United States, judged the entrants on their accuracy when classing the cattle, their speaking ability, and their ability to make comparisons between the cattle.

He said Mr Llewellyn "saw the cattle well".

"His description of the cattle was accurate," Mr Shike said.

"In terms of placings, I think he only had one pair switch. Two of the classes he got right, and one class he just had a two point

"He saw the cattle very similarly to me, and he did a really good job."

Mr Llewellyn has grown up around beef cattle, with his family running Keith's Jillangolo Red Angus stud.

He said he would like to be involved in beef cattle for years to come.

Mr Llewellyn will head to the 2022 Sydney Royal Show to compete in the 2021 national finals for young judges which was postponed after the Royal Queensland Show (Ekka) was cancelled in August this year.







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AKM Red Angus

My name is Amelie (Millie) Martin and I am the owner of the AKM Red Angus stud. My stud is located between Woodford and Kilcoy in the Sunshine Coast hinterland of south-east Queensland.

I was lucky enough to be born into cattle with mum and dad purchasing the 40 acre property we live on in 2001, following a five year stint in Charleville. They spent a lot of time with the Sommerfield family north-west of Charleville on the Cooladdi district properties Norah Park and Canegrass. Dad also had a family connection to the cattle industry through his uncle and auntie at the Wandoan-district property, Gilligulgul.

Dad purchased his first Red Angus female from BST Tullatoola at the National Show and Sale in Dubbo in 2013. As a then ten year old, I was probably more excited by the trip to Western Plains Zoo, but it wasn't long before I finally caught the cattle

As dad's Palmview herd grew, trips to local shows and the EKKA became a more regular part of my weekends, especially during

our winter show season. It was at these shows that I started to meet some of the other Red Angus breeders and owners, and soon enough I was hooked. Maryanne Kearney (Boonyouin), Heather Davies (Rosemullion), Kirrily and Brooke Iseppi (GK Livestock), Craig and Rene Gapes (Triple M) and Stu and Di Greenwood (Greenwood Park) were a few of the breeders who encouraged me to take a greater interest in the breed. Ultimately, I purchased my first animal, Boonyouin Trix M26 from the Power of Red Sale in 2017. Soon after purchasing Trix, she and I attended Toogoolawah Cattle Camp together and my interest in cattle showing was off and racing. I followed this purchase up with the purchase of another heifer I saw at the EKKA in 2019. Rosemullion Red Penelope P8 (Piggy), owned by Heather and Greg Davies was a sweet-natured, beautifully structured heifer that I was keen to purchase. Lucky for me, Heather agreed to sell her to me. Piggy and I attended Angus Round Up in Toowoomba in 2020.

Both of my initial heifers have now produced offspring which are continuing the great work of their mothers. Trix's second calf, a bull calf, sold at this year's POR sale in Toowoomba as

AKM Reign R1. He made \$6000 and was purchased by a Chinchilla couple for use in their Droughtmaster herd. Late last year, Piggy produced her first calf, also a bull calf, who I am currently growing to show and ultimately sell at next year's Power of Red sale.

So why Red Angus for me? The answer is simple – beautiful temperament. Easy to work with, sweet-natured, calving ease, highly fertile and moderately framed. When I walk into the paddock, my cattle walk up to me to say hello. I feel completely safe and at ease around them and can't ever see myself with a different cattle breed.

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Beef 2021:

GK Livestock dominate Red Angus showing

A small but high quality showing of Red Angus cattle gave NSW judge James McWilliam plenty to ponder but ultimately the Iseppi family, GK Livestock, Dalby, proudly claimed top bull and cow honors at Beef Australia.

In their first showing at Beef since 2012, Kirrily and daughter Brooke were delighted to see their 17-month-old bull, GK Queensland Tradition Q12, named grand champion bull while GK Red 1B Platinum Ruba was sashed grand champion female.

A son of Red Lazy MC Tradition 111C, Queensland Tradition weighed in at $844 \, \mathrm{kg}$.

He impressed the judge in the junior classes with his walkability before going on to claim grand champion.

GK Livestock also took home the male calf champion honours for Round-Em-Up Rascal.

Grand champion cow, GK Red 1B Platinum Ruba P26 was shown with her Cockburn Assassin heifer calf.

She went on to place in the top four in the interbreed while the GK Livestock breeders group also featured highly in the interbreed

Kirrily said GK Red 1B Platinum Ruba was a natural calf out of GK Red Ruba 26 G40 - a cow that won supreme female twice at the Royal Easter Show in Sydney in 2015 and 2017 and was named supreme beef exhibit at Sydney in 2017.

"I imported G40 from Canada as an embryo so that cow line really means a lot to us," she said.

"Platinum Ruba is just a beautiful, big, deep bodied cow and very structurally correct. She will go on to Brisbane and we are looking forward to that."

In his closing remarks about the female classes Mr McWilliam described the winning female as a "proper good cow" and said her neat udder and good foot shape make her the complete package.

GK Livestock also took home the female calf champion ribbon for Triple M Morojitti R12 while the junior champion female honours were claimed by Springvale Qadnce, exhibited by Springvale Red Angus, Proston.

Spectators were heartened to see the big effort from the students from St Josephs Nudgee College who took home the reserve female calf champion ribbon for Kedmaw Cherok.

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The Invitational Red Angus Bull Sale hits next milestone after bulls complete 70 days on feed

The first crop of graduates from The Invitational Red Angus Bull Sale feed efficiency trial were given glowing reviews from vendors and assessors after completing 70 days at the UNE Smart Farm Tullimba Feedlot outside of Armidale.

Interest within the industry was high to see if a catalogue of bulls from vendors in NSW and South East Queensland could be prepared under the same pre-sale conditions and compared on structural and scanning data.

The 45 bulls were delivered to the feedlot in September aged from eight to 14 months, run together in an orientation period for 14 days, before beginning a preliminary feed and then progressing to a 70 day ration.

From there independent assessors selected the best 35 to be auctioned in Tamworth on April 30.

Vendors had their first glimpse of the sale entries during an open day on Thursday where the structural integrity of the group was praised, especially after enduring a waterlogged December on feed.

Having completed the trial on Wednesday, Roger Evans of Bovine Scanning Services at Tamworth scanned all of the bulls on Saturday along with completing a structural assessment.

He then assisted fellow assessors Roger Hann and Ross Anderson in selecting the top draft.

Mr Evans said overall the bulls were very uniform and would fit into the marketplace offering a good combination of growth for age, yield, softness and varying degrees of intramuscular fat.

"It was very interesting because there is different ages and there is cattle that have compensatory gain but the pleasing thing is after 70 days on feed it's easy to identify cattle that are going to

suit different marketplaces," he said.

"There is cattle with some yield and a little bit less fat, there is also cattle with a bit more fat, maintain muscle and then different degrees of IMF so there are cattle that are going to suit a lot of different production systems."

On average the group put on 123.8 kilograms for an average daily weight gain of 1.7kg having consumed an average of 15.52kg each day.

The average feed conversion rate (kilogram of growth/kilogram of feed) was 0.11.

Meanwhile, Yallambee Q56 and RA Q09 had the biggest IMF scores of 7.5 per cent while 13-month-old AK R2 had the largest growth rate from start to finish of 1.84kg/day. The feed trial top gainer was RA Q09 with a gain of 2.55kg/day.

The response to the trial was so positive that Red Angus breeders are already turning their attention to how they can grow the concept and potentially develop their Breedplan dataset, like net feed intake, by running a steer trial with the sale bull progeny.

Compared to their Angus counterparts, Red Angus Breedplan doesn't feature structure, NFI and days to calving estimated breeding values while also having one less index.

Southern Beef Technology Services technical officer Boyd Gudex said there was scope to build on the data but large quantities were needed to make an EBV available.

"There is a critical mass of data required for an EBV to be calculated; without it you don't have the statistical accuracy," he said

"The more data you collect the more you are building towards that critical mass and having that available.

"The first step is to try and continue this kind of thing...ideally you want a steer trial where you have whole mobs.

"These bulls represent a selected few from every herd.

"You are seeing the better animals so you are not going to get an idea of the whole genetic variation of the herd so if you have a whole mob of steers where there has been no culling you get an idea of the whole genetic variation and we need that for sorting out basic statistics."

Assessor Roger Hann from Moree supported the steer trial idea and commended breeders on the line of bulls.

"The feet and legs on the bulls was excellent, the temperament was quite outstanding compared to some other breeds, it was a delight to be able to work with them and the carcase component was excellent," he said.

The multi-vendor bull sale trial is a first for any breed and organiser Graham Jordan of Goonoo Red Angus, Tamworth, declared it very successful.

"It's gone fantastically well as you can see by the bulls the end result," he said.

The bulls will return to their original homes until the sale day.











Yallambee tops first ever Red Angus invitational bull sale at \$20,000

Organisers of inaugural Red Angus Invitational bull sale were pleased with the results of Friday's sale

in Tamworth with Southern Highlands stud Yallambee topping the sale at \$20,000.

Of the 36 bulls advertised for the sale, seven were withdrawn, with 17 sold at an average of \$9529 for a clearance rate of 58 per cent.

A syndicate of Goondoola Livestock, Cargo, and Elliott and Allyson Connors, JP Red Angus, Scone, were the successful bidders for Yallambie Revival (YRAQ56), which was sired by Red Northline Revival and out of Red Northline Fat Tina.

The sale was a first for the industry as all bulls up for bids had recently completed a trial of 70 days at the UNE Smart Farm Tullimba Feedlot outside of Armidale, before returning home for Friday's sale.

At the conclusion of the trial, the top-selling 17-month-old bull weighed 764 kilograms, which was up from 533kg at the start of trial, had fat depth measurements of 22mm and

13mm up from 6mm and 4mm, an eye muscle area (EMA) of 111 square centimetres, up from 87sq cm and a 37cm scrotal circumference.

He also had the biggest IMF score of 7.5 per cent at the end of the feedlot trial.

"We were looking for a bull that had that extra EMA which would balance with our females, but we were also looking for positive fats and he had quite good fat cover that you don't often find in a bull with good EMAs," JP Red Angus director Elliott Connors told The Land.

"Those were the qualities that really attracted us as well as his total outcross, there is none of them here in Australia, so that's what's really going to help us and let our little herd keep going forward.

"When Nicole and Hannah Powe put the idea of a syndicate to us we were more than happy to jump on board, it's perfect all around and honestly, we couldn't find anything wrong with him whatsoever"

Goondoola Livestock principal Hannah Powe echoed Mr Connors' sentiments, saying Yallambie Revival was "a definite standout".

"He's total outcross, which is something we are always chasing," Ms Powe said.

"As well as that, he was backed by that carcase data that we're looking for in terms of having a high IMF and high EMA, to combine those two with being a total outcross was great for us.

"For us, he will pretty much go straight to work and we will coordinate with Elliott in terms of if he goes to him and joins with his spring cows and we Al in the spring.

"He will be collected, we have some semen interest in him and we look forward to seeing where we go from there."

Yallambie stud principal David Croker, Berrima, said while the inaugural sale was "a bit tight in places" it was a great place to start.

"We had to start somewhere with this program and I thought all the bulls were of a really good quality," Mr Croker said.

"It will be on again next year, we had a great crowd in Tamworth

today [Friday] and hopefully we can gain some good momentum into next year."

Malaleuca Pastoral, Casino, were the most prolific buyers taking home six bulls at an average of \$8333, while Bill and Deborah Plevey, Manilla, took home two bulls at an average of \$14,500.

"The muscle and the thickness were what peaked our interest," Malaleuca Pastoral's Wayne Cooke said.

"There was a very good range of Red Angus bulls for us to look at and the bulls we purchased will be joined to heifers in the next month or so."

Elders were agents with Paul Dooley as auctioneer.

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TIPPING the scales at a whopping 1212 kilograms as the heaviest bull on grounds, Round-Em-Up The Night P012, ruled the Red Angus ring taking out supreme exhibit of the breed.

Exhibited by David and Ashleigh Hobbs and family of Round-Em-Up Red Angus, Molong, the grand champion bull was sired by breed legend RRA The Night and out of Round-Em-Up Vera K013

"Power, performance, efficiency and explosive muscle through the hind quarter" were words used by judge Erica Halliday of Ben Nevis Angus, Walcha, to describe the 30-month-old senior champion.

"This bull offers extra performance, he is a bull that you can tell is efficient, balanced and is hard to fault," Mrs Halliday said.

"He is structurally correct, wide, long, has strength of spring and the overall muscle depth, extra depth of rib and the overall package that he offers with a masculine head, neck and muzzle has got him on top."

Combining an interesting mix of old school genetics with reasonable new genetics, the stand-out sire has been used by the stud and will possibly head to Beef Australia 2021 next month.

"He has the cow king in Indeed, the carcase and maternal side in Canyon, and RRA The Knight just keeps doing it," Mr Hobbs said

Already making headways within the breed internationally, semen from The Night P012 has been picked up by North American breeders.

"Six Mile have the Canadian semen rights, and Lodoen Cattle Company (L83 Ranch) have the US rights," he said. "We will market semen here."

Packing over 1200kg of beef, he measured 140 square centimetre eye muscle area (EMA) with rump and rib fat measurements of 29 millimetres and 16mm.

He overcame the junior and grand champion female in Mellowood 1B Queen Rose, exhibited by the Knee family of Mellowood Red Angus, Loomberah, for the top title.

Sired by Red Double B Bullseye 1B and out of GK Red 26 Rose, she was a rising 17-month-old and won the biggest class of the day.

"I'm delighted by the junior female, she is just stunning, oozes quality, has that mid-maturity pattern and she is the type of female that we like to breed," judge Mrs Halliday said.

Mellowood exhibited the senior champion female, GK Red Bella MB N36 that showed with two-month-old bull calf at foot, Mellowood 2P Red Sniper S03, and reserve senior bull, Mellowood 3A Mr Q. They also won pair of bulls and the sire's progeny class.

Diamond Red Angus, Cowra claimed junior champion bull with Diamond Red Revolver, reserve junior female with Diamond Miss Quiteacatch Q503 and first in the breeder's group class.

First time Sydney entrants Hanna Wade and Brodie Kelly of Kelly's Creek Livestock, Kurrajong exhibited the reserve senior female, Redgums Rosie.

Numbers were back in the Red Angus with 15 head from five studs representing the breed.

Sydney Royal 2021 Carcase Competition

Red Angus have performed well in the Sydney Royal Carcase Competition.

Reserve heavyweight champion went to a Red Angus steer exhibited by Kinross Wolaroi School, Orange and bred by Jason Tom, Parkes, that was sired by Hobbs Livestock None Better. With a score of 93 points it was the second highest scoring carcase of the entire competition. It was purchased by NH Foods – Wingham Beef Exports.

A Limousin/Red Angus cross steer from Macarthur Anglican School, Cobbitty, has won champion trade carcase. Bred by Mick Rawsthorne and Tony Marcochi, Cobbitty, it scored 92.1 points. With a liveweight of 461kg, a top trade carcase had a carcase weight of 272.4kg, a dressing percentage of 59.1 per cent, P8 fat depth of 7mm and rib fat depth of 5mm and a rib eye area of 99 sq cm.

It measured a marble score one, had a MSA Index of 57.2 and received the only gold medal of the competition.



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Red Angus record of \$26,000 at Hicks Beef

When he paid \$26,000 for his choice of the Red Angus draft offered by the Hicks family at the Hicks Beef Spring Bull Sale at Holbrook, last Wednesday Stuart Archer had no idea it would become the record price paid for a Red Angus bull.

The cattle producer from Weymouth Farms Pastoral, Beechford, Tasmania, was not able to attend the sale and view the draft of Red Angus bulls due to COVID-19, but he was happy with the opinion given by an independent assessor.

"His figures are what we were looking for and once I was told his temperament and conformation were excellent, I was happy to buy the bull," Mr Archer said.

"It was more than double what I've paid before, but I'm not scared of paying top money when I see a bull I like."

Mr Archer's choice, Hicks Henry Q28 had outstanding carcase data, being in the top one per cent for eye muscle area (EMA), top 5pc for marbling and top 15pc for 400-day weight.

Described by Hicks Beef co-principal Tom Hicks as "what a cracker", with 50 per cent semen rights retained by the stud.

Mr Archer has been breeding Red Angus for 49 years starting with 30 females. He now joins over 300 females.

"They have a wonderful temperament, and we have consistent inquiry for our cattle from restockers and feedlots," he said.

Mr Archer also selected a second Red Angus bull, Hicks Profit Builder Q75, for \$20,000.











Quality of Quantity; A glimpse at Rivers Red Angus

Rivers Red Angus is a seedstock operation in northern California. With a focus on quality over quantity, we are working to establish an honest set of females through strict culling, Al and now embryo transfer. We retain our own replacement females, confident in their performance and knowing that they excel in the steep environment on annual rangeland forage with minimal inputs. We calve in the fall (September-October) and offer yearling bulls and heifers through consignment sales and private treaty. If I was asked to share my wildest dream, I would admit that it is to be able to expand and host our own annual production sale.





We have confidence in the Red Angus breed for many reasons. We have to have females that can travel on good feet and legs, milk well but not too much to pull them down condition wise, stay in good flesh year-round and bring in an above average calf. Red females excel in these areas. We emphasize udder structure, teat placement and hoof and leg structure with fertility being of obvious importance. If they can't travel and hold up physically, they are culled early on which is not economically viable. One of the first traits we cull for though, even before we look at structure and performance is docility. We have three kids (6, 3 and 3 months old) that are always close by when we work cattle and we don't want to take any chances of them getting hurt. With Red Angus, that's rarely a concern.

While Red Angus are the most sought-after females across the United States, in California the breed is just starting to be recognized and considered for its multi-trait contributions and maternal advantages in comparison with the popular Black Angus cattle. It's really a rewarding and exciting time to be a part of the Red Angus breed. Our family is blessed to be raising the next generation of ranchers.














Umbearra Station

ANGUS & KIMBERLEY MCKAY

For over 65 years the McKay family of Umbearra Station has been growing their beef cattle operation in central Australia, and now they are one of the biggest Red Angus herds in the country.

Angus and Kimberley McKay along with their children Oliver, Millie and Aubrie operate their beef business across roughly 8228 square kilometres of land three hours south of Alice Springs on the Northern Territory and South Australian border.

In 2019 expanded their Umbearra property, purchasing the adjoining Idracowra Station.

"It doubled our size," Mr McKay said.

"Not often properties come up for sale, and rarely adjoining so we had to jump at it," Mrs McKay added.

HISTORY

Mr McKay began managing the family's Umbearra Station after returning from boarding school when he was 18. Soon after at 24, he and Kimberley (19 at the time) took over the operation as Angus' father Thomas stepped back.

"Thomas' father Leith McKay bought Umbearra Station over 65 years ago," Mrs McKay said.

"Leith never lived here, he had managers. When Thomas was 18, he took over management for Leith.

"At 21 he bought the adjoining Kelgera Station, and he lived here until he was in his late 50s, retiring 16 years ago to a property in South Australia, and Angus and I took over from him in 2006.

"We've been running it now for 15 years."

During the 13 years Angus and Kimberley spent managing the station, Thomas stepped back allowing them to make their own decisions which resulted in them changing producing certified organic bullocks.

CHANGING WAYS

Previously light steers were sold; however, Angus and Kimberley made the choice to switch to selling heavier bullocks.

"It was a personal choice, we liked growing the cattle out. It is satisfying putting a bullock onto a truck," Mrs McKay said.

"Bullocks get to anywhere between 600-700 kilograms at two years of age," Mr McKay said.

"They are for the certified organic bullock job and are mainly sent to Victorian processors."

In Central Australia most producers are farming organically, therefore when several stations in the area opted to get certified the McKay's did the same.

"We grow cattle organically anyway, so it was a simple step to get access to better grid prices and value per kilogram," Mrs McKay said.

"It was two weeks of solid bookwork to get certificates, but it was a trend in the area that all the neighbours did together, and worth it for the extra dollars in organic certified."

The bullocks are grown out at Umbearra.

The McKays also have entered a benchmarking program with Phil Holmes and a group of other producers, who they have been working with for 20 years now.

RED ANGUS

Traditionally going back 50 years, Angus' father Thomas ran a Shorthorn/Santa Gertrudis herd.

"In the early 90s he put Brahman bulls over for the live export job up north," Mr McKay said.

A shift in focus to move away from live export and concentrate on the domestic market led them to introducing Red Angus to the mix.

The fertility, growth rate and muscle of the Red Angus attracted the McKay's and they have not looked back since.

"Around 25 years ago Thomas gave Red Angus a go, and they did well. They seem to do well in this area," Mrs McKay said.

The McKay family has been purchasing Red Angus bulls for close to 30 years.

"Traditionally they came from the Hawker family of Anama, and a lot of the bulls in the early days were from Drayton Park," he said.

"In the later years they have been from Paringa in Victoria

"We run up to 200 bulls."

Mr McKay said, "the perfect bull for this country is a pretty average herd bull - we don't want huge growth, birth weight or milk".

"Most of the bull selection is based on milk values, and big 400- and 600-day weights," he said.

"For us here, it is fairly desolate, and we cannot sustain big milk values."

Currently they are running roughly 4500 breeders and 1500 steers, but once they recover from the drought, they strive to have around 5000 breeders

"It will take a year or two to get to that," he said.

Idracowra has been fully destocked for two years, with the end goal to restock with Red Angus breeders.

FERTILITY FOCUS

Fertility is the biggest profit driver for Umbearra Station.

"Everything revolves around fertility," Mr McKay said. "Growth rates of bullocks is second."

The McKay's run an intensive heifer program whereby all replacement heifers are joined to Red Angus bulls and pregnancy tested before joining the breeder paddocks.

"Heifers are weaned in September, and we get them to around 300 kilograms for joining which in good years is 12 to 16 months old," Mr McKay said.

"All maiden heifers are repro scan pregnancy-tested-in-calf, anything empty is culled, and they are then lifetime mated to the bull.

CHALLENGES

"We cull again at their second calving and then they are left to themselves in breeder paddocks."

Their focus on fertility has enabled them to achieve an average pregnancy rate in the low 80 percentile.

"We have been control-mating for 20 years now to get to that fertility level," he said.

"In a good season we can get 86-87 per cent."

The self-replacing operation keeps most of their females to go into the heifer program, except for any broken coloured animals.

"We have quite of lot of Herefords on the surrounding properties, and if they get into our cattle a baldy faced animal is produced," Mrs McKay said.

"Anything with a baldy face is pulled out, not joined and treated like a steer - we like to keep a nice solid Red Angus line."

Over the last few years, the McKays have dabbled in using Santa Gertrudis bulls over some of their mature Red Angus cows to get a slicker coat.

"We want to tailor make a really slick animal," Mr McKay said.

"We are trying to keep 90 per cent Red Angus, and if we start getting too much Santa type, Red Angus go over them again."

"When Idracowra settled we had our third child three weeks later. It was a crazy time, but we are doing this for them."

Idracowra Station has no infrastructure which has created a lot of work for the McKay family who must install cattle yards and solar water points.

"Unlike Idracowra, Umbearra has 28 water points, and every single watering point has a really good working set of cattle yards - it is fully developed," Mrs McKay said.

"In the last six years we pulled down old windmills and put in solar bores to make things easier with staff not having to crank over old engines."

CLIMATE AND ENVIRONMENT

The McKay family is having the best season they have in probably five years.

"We had a terrible run of seasons, 5-6 years of the driest on record worse than the 50s," Mr McKay said.


"We had 13 inches this year [2021], and it is turning around."

Mrs McKay said the country coming out of drought is recovering well and the cattle look magnificent.

"Our average rainfall is 9-10 inches, but it varies every year," she 15-30 millimetres.



Escholar Red Angus Stud

Students participate in the acquiring the knowledge and skills associated with agriculture including the day to day management of a working farm, and gain accreditation in Certificate II in Agriculture.


Escholar Red Angus Stud consists of 30 stud cows, a stud sire from Graham Travelyn Smith, Kildarra North Star N17, purchased in 2019. As result, we have retained 10 heifers and the successful sale of two stud bulls. We are including a program of Al to bring new genetics into the herd to specifically target structural correctness in future generations.

This year students participated in the cattle management, handling, feeding and showing of cattle for the Red Angus Stud. This culminated in students entering the Wagin Woolarama, Perth Royal Show and the local Esperance Agricultural Show and competing in parading, handling and judging of the stud animals.

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BREEDPLAN Top Tips: Collecting Samples for DNA Testing

There are several different sample types that you can collect on your animals for DNA testing purposes. While you should choose the most convenient for your individual circumstances, be aware that some sample types can only be collected once an animal reaches a certain age. In general:

• Tissue sampling units (TSUs) can be used from birth onwards.

TSUs allow beef producers to collect an ear plug sample from their animals using a specialised applicator gun. TSUs are often collected in conjunction with calf tagging and have a unique barcode system that can be linked to the animal ID tags (including NLIS tags). This barcoding system, along with machine processing, means that sample mix-ups are less likely than for other sample types. TSUs can be shipped at room temperature; however, once the tissue samples have been collected, TSUs are not suitable for long term storage in a home environment.

Hair samples can be collected once animals are aged 60 days or older.

Hair samples are collected by pulling approximately 40 hairs from the tail switch of an animal. These hairs should be clean (i.e. free from any foreign matter such as manure) and dry. As the DNA is contained in the root bulb, it is important that hair samples are pulled rather than cut. Collecting hair samples from calves younger than 60 days of age is not recommended as the hair roots are still developing. Instead, hair samples are commonly collected at marking and/or weaning. Hair samples are also suitable for long term storage at room temperature.

Semen samples can be collected from mature bulls.

While other sample types can be collected when bulls are still immature, one advantage of a semen sample is that it can be used to procure DNA when the physical animal is not readily available (e.g. overseas and/or deceased sires). Semen straws should be thawed prior to postage; however, they should not be left to sit at room temperature for prolonged periods of time. Semen straws should also be protected to prevent damage while in transit; placing each straw inside an empty pen is a good option. If sending multiple straws, each should be placed into a separate sealed plastic bag to prevent contamination of all straws should

> one break in the post. Please note that only unopened semen straws can be processed.

No matter the sample type you decide to use for DNA testing, remember that it will take time for the samples to be processed by the genotype service provider and for results (i.e. parentage and/or genetic conditions) to be returned for you. Single-Step BREEDPLAN results (currently available for Angus, Brahman, Hereford, Santa Gertrudis and Wagyu) will take some additional time as they must wait to go through the next scheduled BREEDPLAN analysis. For those wanting Single-Step BREEDPLAN results for sale catalogues, it is recommended that genotypes are sent in at least six months in advance of the analysis for which you plan to extract sale catalogue information. This gives you some leeway in case re-sampling is required.



BREEDPLAN Top Tips: Storing Samples for Future DNA Testing

The long term storage of DNA samples, both for animals with samples already submitted for testing and for those where no DNA testing is envisioned in the near future, is highly recommended. Done correctly, the DNA samples can stored at very low cost and provide 'insurance' against a number of eventualities including:

• Retest required.

A small number of samples will require retesting before a valid DNA result can be obtained. Therefore, the collection and storage of a second spare sample when the first is collected allows a resample to be sent to the laboratory without the need to muster the animal back into the yards for resampling.




Further testing on already tested animals.

Breeders may initially only perform one of the smaller DNA tests (e.g. parentage verification) but decide they want more DNA information (e.g. genetic conditions or 100k genotype) in the future. There is no guarantee that the laboratory will have sufficient sample remaining from the first submission, so having a second sample in storage is convenient for resubmission.

• Future testing on untested animals (alive or dead).

The storage of samples collected on every animal in the herd allows future testing of any animal if any questions regarding parentage and/or genetic condition status arise. This includes future genetic conditions that we are not yet aware of.

Of the three main types of DNA samples available (see 'BREEDPLAN Top Tips: Collecting Samples for DNA Testing' in this magazine), hair samples are particularly well suited for cheap and convenient long term storage. It is recommended that the hair follicles are placed in clearly identified individual paper envelopes and stored in the dark at room temperature (e.g. in an office draw or filling cabinet). The storage of hair samples in plastic bags can lead to them 'sweating' and going mouldy which can adversely affect the DNA quality. Neither semen straws nor TSU samples are recommended for long term storage at room temperature.

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Beef and beer joining forces to reduce emissions

We've always known beef and beer go hand-in-hand, but a new collaboration between MLA, Young Henry's Brewery and the University of Technology Sydney is taking this iconic duo to a whole new level – converting by-products from brewing beer into livestock feeds that reduce methane emissions.

Here, we speak to Doug McNicholl, MLA's Program Manager of Sustainability Innovation, about how this partnership ties into the industry's target to be carbon neutral by 2030.

WHAT ARE YOU HOPING TO ACHIEVE FROM THIS PARTNERSHIP?

The aim is to accelerate and expand MLA's efforts to bring cost-effective, methane-reducing livestock feeds to market to help industry achieve its Carbon Neutral 2030 (CN30) target – a key objective under the Red Meat 2030 Strategy and MLA's Strategic Plan 2025.

Together with our industry partners, we're aiming to develop a methane-mitigating feed supplement in the form of 'microalgae' (grown using the carbon dioxide produced during the brewing process).

Animal feeding trials will be conducted to evaluate the methane reduction and animal productivity benefits of the microalgae. If successful, this process could be implemented in breweries everywhere, plus pave the way for applications in other industries with carbon dioxide suitable for algae production.

Since being announced on Tuesday, news of the partnership has reached more than 20 million people, with the red meat industry featured in positive stories across national TV, radio and newspapers.


HOW DID THE PARTNERSHIP WITH YOUNG HENRY'S AND UTS COME ABOUT?

In 2020, we released our MLA CN30 Roadmap to describe what a carbon neutral red meat industry could look like.

Recognising the need to attract technology and investment partners, we called for proposals under the roadmap's work areas. In collaboration with Young Henry's, UTS successfully pitched their novel feed production concept. MLA is investing in the project using Commonwealth Government funds via the MLA Donor Company.

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WHY IS MLA INVESTING IN THIS?

Feed additives that can reduce livestock methane emissions and improve livestock productivity are an important part of the CN30 Roadmap. Investments like this also support the circular economy; converting by-products from one industry into valuable product(s) for the red meat industry.

If enough product can be produced to incorporate into feedlot rations and supplementation programs on-farm in a safe, cost-effective way, we're going to make a significant impact on livestock emissions, as well as introduce a new feed supply to industry.

With steady beer consumption in Australia (35.6% according to the 2021 Roy Morgan's Alcohol Consumption Report) and more than 90% of Australian households regularly enjoying beef, it makes sense to bring partnerships like this together.

Australians have a proud history of coming together over a few beers and delicious beef, and partnerships like this will ensure that Aussies can continue that tradition knowing that it's good for them and good for the environment.

Grilled Sirloin and Char-Grilled Vegetable Salad

Prep time: 10 minutes Cook time: 20 minutes

Serves 4

Ingredient

600g sirloin steak, fat trimmed
3 tbsp olive oil
350g sweet potato, peeled, thinly sliced
2 large zucchini, thinly sliced lengthways
1 red onion, cut into thin wedges
120g rocket leaves
Zest and juice of 1 lemon
60g feta cheese, crumbled
¼ cup pine nuts, toasted
Mint leaves, to garnish

Method

- 1. Preheat a barbeque or large char-grill pan over high heat. Brush beef on both sides with 1 tablespoon oil and cook for 3-4 minutes on each side, or until cooked to your liking. Set aside on a plate loosely covered with foil to rest for 5 minutes. Thinly slice beef.
- 2. Meanwhile, place sweet potato, zucchini and onion into a large bowl. Add 1 tbsp oil, season and toss to coat. Cook on same barbecue or chargrill pan over high heat, in batches, for 1-2 minutes each side, or until tender and lightly charred.
- 3. To serve, place rocket onto a large serving platter and top with vegetables and beef. Drizzle with remaining oil and lemon juice. Season. Sprinkle with lemon zest, feta and pine nuts. Garnish with mint leaves, to serve.



Tips

- Brush each steak lightly with oil.
- Preheat the barbecue to hot before adding the steak. The steak should sizzle as it makes contact with the plate or grill.
- Cook one side until the first sign of moisture appears on the upper side, turn and cook the other side. Turn once only for rare and medium.
- Test for doneness with tongs. Rare is soft when pressed, medium is springy but still soft and well done is very firm. Remove steak and cover loosely, rest in a warm place for a few minutes before serving.

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
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
